# Letter from the Chairman of the Fundraising Committee

Dear Fellow Dominican OLLI Members and Prospective Members,

Two words, and the concepts behind them that we hear from time to time at the age at which we now find ourselves, are engaged and active. For the past five years, my wife Lois and I have certainly been engaged by the amazing educational offerings of Dominican OLLI, taking the maximum of four courses every session. As a new member of the Advisory Council and now Chair of the Fundraising Committee, I now have an opportunity to be active in this wonderful organization.

The Annual Fund supports several major areas. The largest initiative provides tuition support for course attendees who cannot afford full tuition. Approximately 50 scholarships are provided for the academic year. The Fund also supports technology improvements including an AED for emergencies and much improved individual hearing assistance devices. #### **ART AND MUSIC**

American Folk Music: The Golden Age, 1950-75

Mondays, January 13 - March 15 (eight classes) 12:30 - 2:10 p.m. | No classes Jan. 20 and Feb. 17

Location: Guzman Lecture Hall, Dominican Campus

The folk music that emerged in the 1950's has lasted 60 years and will last a lot longer. Why? Because of the confluence of people, politics, philosophy and social awareness that came out of the post-war era which ushered in a new age of enlightenment. This course will examine the soundtrack of that period and how folk music became integrated into the larger world of popular music. Starring: Woody Guthrie, Pete Seeger, The Kingston Trio, Bob Dylan, Joan Baez, Peter, Paul and Mary, Phil Ochs, Judy Collins, and many others.

#### After Raphael: Counter-Reformation Rome and Beyond

Wednesdays, January 15 - March 4 (eight classes) 10:00 - 11:45 a.m.

Location: Villa Marin, 100 Thorndale Drive, San Rafael

On May 6, 1527, an army of starving soldiers ravaged Rome, leaving half the inhabitants dead and the city stripped bare. Was the High Renaissance truly over? Rome soon recovered. Popes, cardinals, and aristocratic Romans set about rebuilding Rome, commissioning vast fresco cycles and villas. Michelangelo's Last Judgment, the Pauline Chapel, Capitoline, and the completion of Saint Peter's meant that Rome had won, but the splendor of Renaissance Rome would not shine until Sixtus V and the glories of Baroque Rome.

#### The Richness of Rossini: The Amazing Operas of a Bel Canto Master

Fridays, January 17 - March 6 (eight classes) 1:30 - 3:15 p.m.

The famous composer of the sparkling operatic comedy The Barber of Seville, Gioachino Rossini, was a fascinating figure in the history of music who created his very own musical style in the bel canto ("beautiful singing") period of the early 1800s. His music is unmatched for its effervescent wit, dazzling virtuosity, and brilliant flair. In this course we will explore the early, lesser-known comedies of this teenage prodigy, beloved Italian comic works like The Italian Girl in Algiers and Cinderella, and imposing serious operas like Tancredi and Semiramide, culminating with his final masterpiece, the French grand opera William Tell. We will exult in glorious singing and compelling storytelling as we use video examples (with subtitles) to explore the richness of Rossini.

In this follow-up to "The Films of Alfred Hitchcock 1942–1963," we'll look at six more Hitchcock classics: "Foreign Correspondent," "Shadow of a Doubt," "Notorious," "Rope," "Strangers on a Train" and "Vertigo." What were Hitchcock's recurrent themes? Why was he a master of effects as well as suspense? What special challenge did he give himself with Rope? Which of these six films did he claim as his personal favorite? Alfred Hitchcock tantalized, thrilled, and terrified us for decades, all the while reminding us, "It's only a movie."

#### Satire, Parody, and Farce: In Performance

Satire, parody, and farce are among the most ancient, popular, and enduring forms of comedy — on the page, the stage, and the screen. This course will examine the history and practice of these three comic species in performance from Aristophanes to Stephen Colbert. Satires to be considered will range from Gilbert & Sullivan to Lenny Bruce, parodies from "Don Quixote" to "Saturday Night Live," farces from commedia dell'arte to classics by Charlie Chaplin, Lucille Ball, and Peter Sellers. Video clips of comic performances will be a significant component of the course.

Global Hotspots: Part 2

Featured rulers include Elizabeth I and George III, with counterpoints provided by notable knaves like Sir Francis Drake and Oscar Wilde. Lectures will be augmented by extensive visuals.

In this course we will trace the tumultuous and controversial careers of this remarkable clan, from John and Abigail — America's first 'power couple,' — to John Quincy, the child prodigy who followed in his father's footsteps, to diplomat Charles Francis, and concluding with Henry, the brilliant historian and journalist.

## Winter 2020 Registration: Frequently Asked Questions

#### When does registration begin?

Winter registration begins on Monday, December 2, for Premium Members and Monday. December 9. for Basic and Session Members.

#### When should I register?

Early registration is strongly recommended. All members must register by the first day of the course(s).

#### How do I register?

There are two ways to register:

- Register Online: Go to the OLLI website at dominican.edu/osher and click on the Register Now link.
- Register by Mail or In Person: Complete the paper form and mail it or drop it off at the OLLI office.

#### May I register by phone?

No, we are unable to accept registrations via telephone.

#### How do I know my enrollment is confirmed?

You will receive an enrollment confirmation via email. If you have any questions please call (415) 458-3763.

#### What is the OLLI refund policy?

Members are eligible for a refund of all fees minus an administrative fee of \$25, if the request is received in writing at least one week before the first class of the session.

#### May courses be audited?

Dominican students (undergraduate and graduate) may audit courses. Otherwise, auditing is not permitted. Additionally, please be informed, members may not visit courses that are full.

#### What is the OLLI guest policy?

- We encourage and welcome guests who are not current or past OLLI members.
- Guests are only permitted to attend courses that are not full/closed. OLLI members are asked to contact the OLLI office at (415) 458-3763 to confirm space availability.
- OLLI members enrolled in a course may bring up to two guests to one class. A guest may attend only once, even with different hosts. Before attending a second class of a course, the guest must register for the entire course.
- Absent members cannot send replacements to class (registrations are non-transferable).

#### Does OLLI offer scholarships?

Yes. If you wish to be considered for a scholarship, please send a personal letter with your contact information and your most recent tax statement (the page with the taxable income). We recommend that you send your request before **December 2, 2019.** If you are selected for a scholarship, you pay the administrative fee of \$25 each session and may attend one course per session.
